# Gonzales Poll – Part 1: Maryland Statewide



**Gonzales Poll** 

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### **Background and Methodology**

Patrick E. Gonzales graduated magna cum laude from the University of Baltimore with a degree in political science.

His career in the field of public opinion research began in the mid-1980s as an analyst with *Mason-Dixon Opinion Research*. During this time, Mr. Gonzales helped develop, craft and implement election surveys and exit polls for television and radio in the Baltimore-Washington D.C. metro area.

Mr. Gonzales has polled and analyzed well over a thousand elections in Maryland and across the country since that time. Furthermore, he and his associates have conducted numerous market research projects, crafting message development plans and generating strategy blueprints for businesses and organizations throughout the state.

Over his 35 years conducting public opinion polls, Patrick Gonzales has been widely recognized by his peers for his ability to conduct unbiased surveys, and analyze the results in an impartial, evenhanded manner.

Mr. Gonzales appears frequently on radio and television in the Baltimore-D.C. region as a guest commentator.

This poll was conducted by *Gonzales Research & Media Services* from January 23<sup>rd</sup> through February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2024. A total of 815 registered voters in Maryland who vote regularly were queried by live telephone interviews, utilizing both landline and cell phone numbers. A cross-section of interviews was conducted throughout the state, reflecting general election voting patterns.

The margin of error (MOE), per accepted statistical standards, is a range of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. If the entire population was surveyed, there is a 95% probability that the true numbers would fall within this range.

### **Synopsis**

Moving toward the midway mark of his 2<sup>nd</sup> legislative session in Annapolis, Wes Moore remains well-positioned with Maryland voters.

Statewide, 58% approve of the job Moore is doing as governor (within the margin of the sixty percent approval he had in October), while 28% disapprove, with 14% offering no opinion...74% of Democrats approve of the job Governor Moore is doing, as do 52% of independent voters.

Among state Republicans, 57% disapprove, but intense censure is barely one-in-three (36% "strong" disapproval). Contrast this with what will be revealed in Part 2's report tomorrow displaying GOP attitudes generally toward elected Democrats.

By race, 52% of whites and 70% of African-Americans approve of the job Wes Moore is doing as governor.

In his State of the State speech last week, Governor Moore promised that Maryland would "win the decade," and that toward this end his administration would enact "policies as bold as our aspirations." Part of winning the 2020s with bold policies will require figuring a way to fill the gap on transportation funding.

Due to a 3 billion dollar budget deficit, transportation projects for roads, bridges, and mass transit in Maryland are being cut across the state. We asked voters if they would support or oppose raising the sales tax from 6 percent to 7 percent to fund transportation projects...37% support raising the sales tax for funding transportation projects, while 60% oppose raising the sales tax from six percent to seven percent to finance roads/bridges & mass transit- 48% "strongly" oppose.

Another prickly matter for Governor Moore to navigate toward reaching his goal of winning the decade involve policy initiatives surrounding criminal justice concerns in the state. We replicated a question posed last year – respondents were told that it's now only a misdemeanor in Maryland to possess a stolen

firearm, and asked whether they agree or disagree that it should be made a felony in the state to possess a stolen firearm?

Just as last year, an astounding near-ninety percent of Marylanders are in harmony... 88% agree that it should be a felony to possess a stolen firearm (74% "strongly"), while a meager 11% disagree.

Passionate support for this is across the board. Voters born after 9/11 and those who first alit prior to Pearl Harbor (and everyone in-between) speak with a single, clear voice – the legislature in Annapolis needs to make it a felony to possess a stolen firearm in Maryland.

In light of the tragedy last month in Kansas City, we asked voters: "Would you support or oppose a mandatory penalty of at least 10 years in prison for anyone convicted of selling drugs laced with fentanyl if the drug resulted in a death?"


Overall, 83% of Maryland voters support a mandatory penalty of at least 10 years in prison, while only 13% oppose this mandatory prison penalty. Seventy-six percent of Democrats, 86% of independents, 94% of Republicans, and 80% of African-American voters support a mandatory penalty of at least 10 years in prison for anyone convicted of selling drugs laced with fentanyl if the drug results in a death.

In this day and age, anyone thinking of using or selling drugs potentially laced with fentanyl might want to follow advice offered 40 years ago...just say no.

### **Gonzales Poll - Maryland Statewide Results**

#### **Governor Wes Moore Job Approval**

As Wes Moore nears the halfway point of his second session, 58% approve of the job he is doing as governor (28% "strongly" approve and 30% "somewhat" approve), while 28% disapprove of the job he's doing (15% "strongly" disapprove and 13% "somewhat" disapprove), with 14% giving no response.



By party, 74% of Democrats approve of the job Governor Moore is doing, while 57% of Republicans disapprove. Among independents, 52% approve and 26% disapprove.

#### **Sales Tax Increase to Fund Transportation**

Due to a 3 billion dollar budget deficit, transportation projects for roads, bridges, and mass transit in Maryland are being cut in every county in the state. We asked voters if they support or oppose raising the sales tax from 6 percent to 7 percent to fund transportation projects. Statewide, 37% support raising the sales tax to fund transportation projects (14% "strongly" support and 23% "somewhat" support), while 60% oppose raising the sales tax from 6 percent to 7 percent (48% "strongly" oppose and 12% "somewhat" oppose), with 3% providing no answer.

Fifty-three percent of Democrats support taking the sales tax from 6 percent to 7 percent to fund transportation, while 86% of Republicans oppose it (80% "strongly" oppose). Among unaffiliated voters, 71% oppose raising the sales tax to pay for transportation projects.

#### Transportation Funding Priority – Roads/Bridges or Mass Transit


Among voters, 64% say maintaining and improving the roads and bridges in Maryland should receive the higher priority regarding transportation funding, while 26% believe maintaining and improving mass transit in Maryland, such as buses, light rail and MARC trains, is the greater urgency for transportation funding.

#### **Make Possession of Stolen Firearm a Felony**

We told respondents that it's now only a misdemeanor to possess a stolen firearm in Maryland, and asked whether they agree or disagree that it should be made a felony in Maryland to possess a stolen firearm?

A staggering 88% agree that the legislature in Annapolis should make it a felony to possess a stolen firearm (74% "strongly" agree and 14% "somewhat" agree), while a scant 11% disagree.



In the Free State, Donkeys and Elephants; black and white; xx and xy chromosomes; Gen Zers to centenarians are all of the same opinion: possession of a stolen firearm should be a felony.

#### **Mandatory 10-Year Prison for Dealing Fentanyl**

A massive 83% support a mandatory penalty of at least 10 years in prison for anyone convicted of selling drugs laced with fentanyl if the drug results in a death (68% "strongly" support and 15% "somewhat" support), while only 13% oppose this.

In every demographic group in Maryland SUPPORT for a mandatory penalty of at least 10 years in prison for anyone convicted of selling drugs laced with fentanyl if the drug results in a death is greater than 3-out-of-4.
